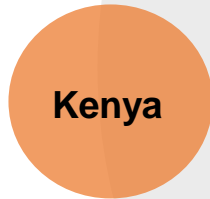

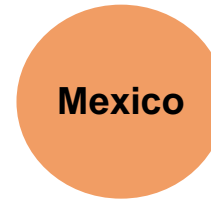

Finalising the Country Pilots

- Pilot countries are currently completing final reports on their activities. These reports will follow the same basic structure, allowing for comparability and collecting of lessons:
 1. *Background – effectiveness challenges to be addressed and why*
 2. *Activities undertaken*
 3. *Results achieved*
 4. *Key findings*
 - *Recommendations*
 - *Next steps*
 - *Reflections on the implementation process*
 - These reports will be submitted by mid-April and will be discussed at a pilot conclusion workshop, scheduled to take place on 8-9 May in Cologne.
 - This workshop will bring together executive and non-executive stakeholders from pilot countries, members of the Enhanced Effectiveness at Country Level working group and representatives of Global Partnership Initiatives to discuss findings.
 - These reports will provide a key source of evidence for the Global Compendium of Good Practices.
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The Global Compendium of Good Practices

- The purpose of the Global Compendium is to provide guidance to countries and their development partners on implementation of effectiveness commitments at country level, drawing on experienced-based evidence. It will cover the five following areas:
 1. Engaging the Full Variety of Development Partners
 2. Strengthening Coordination and Dialogue Mechanisms
 3. Building the Capacity of All Stakeholder Groups
 4. Collecting, Managing and Using Development Co-operation Data
 5. Understanding and Managing Diverse Development Finance Flows
 - Each of these areas will be broken further broken down into specific challenges and proposed good practices, as identified through the global Call for Evidence and complementary research (undertaken as a joint effort with the knowledge sharing workstream).
 - The Call for Evidence received **95 submissions** from over **40 countries and organisations** globally. An additional **248 resources** have been identified through ongoing complementary research.
 - The Global Compendium will also draw on past monitoring findings, the results of the private sector engagement case studies and other Global Partnership work.
 - The structure of the Global Compendium will be reflected in the Knowledge Sharing Platform, allowing good practices to be updated, elaborated and further shared.

Common Challenges

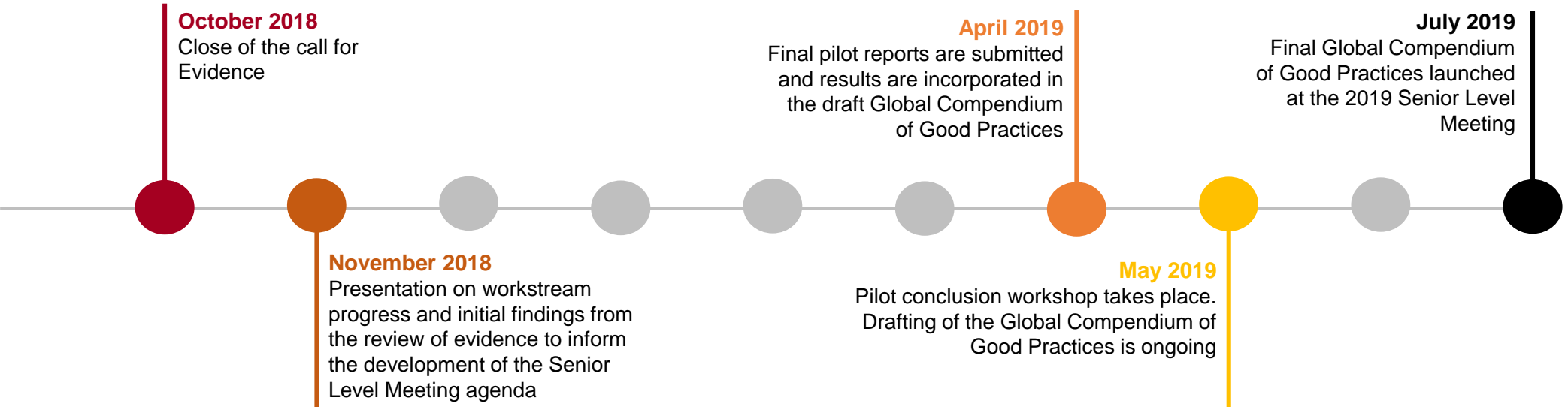
- Engagement with CSOs is ad-hoc
- Engagement with CSOs is not inclusive
- CSOs lack access to vital information
- CSOs lack the capacity to engage in development activities

Good Practices

- Institutionalisation of CSO engagement – in cooperation policies and coordination mechanisms
 - Engaging representative CSO focal points, as designated by CSOs
 - Ensure CSO access to development cooperation information
 - Build the capacity of CSOs
