- Uniquely placed to implement impactful projects at local and country level.
- Shape policies and priorities by participating in multi-stakeholder discussions at all levels, advancing the rights and needs of all – including the most vulnerable.
- Advocate that all development programs, policies, and plans need to be country – owned, focused on results, be inclusive, and transparent.
